



## *I've Been Thinking about . . . A Year with a Friend*

Annually, I spend the entire year with a wise Christian author. These authors become my friends as they sew their thoughts and feelings into my soul. I have spent one year with Oswald Chambers, another year with C. S. Lewis. This year, I am making friends with George Herbert.

George Herbert (1593–1633) was the pastor of a country church in Bemerton, England. He also was one of England's great seventeenth-century metaphysical poets. Herbert's poems exude love for God, devotion to Christ, and lessons for the Christian life. Like the Master Teacher, Herbert uses objects and activities from everyday life to expound spiritual truths. Take, for example, this poem by Herbert:

### **The Pulley**

When God at first made man,  
 Having a glass of blessings standing by,  
 Let us (said He) pour on him all we can:  
 Let the world's riches, which dispersed lie,  
 Contract into a span.

So strength first made a way;  
 Then beauty flowed, then wisdom, honour, pleasure:  
 When almost all was out, God made a stay,  
 Perceiving that alone of all His treasure  
 Rest in the bottom lay.

For if I should (said He)  
 Bestow this jewel also on my creature,  
 He would adore My gifts instead of Me,  
 And rest in nature, not the God of nature:  
 So both should losers be.

Yet let him keep the rest,  
 But keep them with repining restlessness:  
 Let him be rich and weary, that, at least,  
 If goodness lead him not, yet weariness  
 May toss him to My breast.

Why does Herbert entitle this poem "The Pulley" when no pulley is mentioned in the poem? The title explains the poem. Think of a pulley over which a rope is looped, with a bucket tied to each end of the rope. One bucket is full, the other empty. As the pulley sends the full bucket down, the empty bucket up is tossed up to the pulley to be filled in its turn. Likewise, we have a bucket full of blessings sent down from God: strength, beauty, wisdom, honor, pleasure. Yet God has withheld rest from the bucket of blessings, lest we find rest in God's blessings rather than in God Himself. The lack of rest is the empty bucket. With the full bucket of blessings comes a restlessness, a weariness, which weighs us down. That tosses the empty bucket, our lack of rest, up to the pulley—God Himself—in whom alone we find rest.

Herbert's message in "The Pulley" is that we find rest not in God's blessings but in God Himself. With the fullness of God's blessings we also have a restless weariness that (in the last line of the poem) tosses us to God's breast, wherein we find rest. (The letters r-e-s-t are in "breast.")

Jesus said, "Come to me, all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest" (Matt 11:28). George Herbert is becoming my good friend because he points me to my Best Friend.

Heart Thoughts for Cornerstone

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I hope these past months of my Cornerstone Articles have been encouraging and challenging to you. I continue to be amazed at what God uses in my life to speak His truth and love. I never thought I would have come across something like my dad's poem that would speak so powerfully to me. Sometimes it's nice to be able to read a whole poem through as you are dissecting it line by line. So here it is once more in its entirety:

*"The Lord never gives up on me  
He sticks with me every day.  
He is patient with me as I make weak efforts at living for Him.  
He is always faithfully providing for me.  
He never lets me get totally discouraged, feeling like there's no hope.  
He always lifts me up by his love and strength,  
To become more like Christ."*

So, with that, let's take a look at the line "*He is always faithfully providing for me.*" Probably one of the first thoughts that comes into our mind when we read this is money. God is always providing financially for me, or that is the area we need him most. As that is one piece of the pie, that one piece doesn't make up the whole pie. God's provision financially doesn't define His faithfulness.

The first thing we need to recognize is the steadfastness of the Lord. In the words "*He is always*" we can find a security in knowing that God never changes. Hebrews 13:8 says this "Jesus Christ [GOD] is the same yesterday, today and forever" (parentheses added). The same God who delivered and provided for Moses is the same God who wants to deliver and provide for you. He hasn't changed!! Yes, the world has drastically changed, we have changed, but God has not changed. No matter what we do, say, feel, or think, God will always be there, never changing. No matter what has happened to us or done to us God still will be God and will love you. For me, an ever-changing person, it's nice to know there's somebody who loves me who I can rely on to always be that rock in my life. God is always.

The second thing we need to recognize is his faithfulness. His faithfulness is tied to his never-changing character. It makes more sense then that no matter how bad we mess up, time and time again, because of God's unchanging character, He will always be there to take care of us. Think of faithfulness more as "to be" rather to "to get." God will always **be** with you. To fully grasp the faithfulness of God you need to **be** in his presence. When you have no money to pay a bill and an unexpected check shows up for the exact amount you need to pay your bill, God provided. You see, God wants to take care of you. If you are in Christ, you are a child of God. What parent wouldn't want to take care of their child's needs? They are faithful just like God is faithful. It might just not be financially that God demonstrates His presence in your life. You might get a call from your good friend who doesn't know you are about to attempt suicide. That friend reminds you how important you are to them and now you have been reminded of your purpose here on earth. God literally saved your life. Faithful? I would say so.

God's faithfulness is experienced by being in His presence. When was the last time you spent time with God? The more you expose yourself to God, the more you will see His faithfulness.

## “On Becoming a Smarty-pants”

When a famous professor said science shows there is no Creator, Grandma replied, “Any old rock knows more than that smarty-pants!” She spoke from the wisdom of many years of knowing God through the Bible. Grandma was no anti-intellectual, but she had little respect for scholars without common sense.

Either as a student or as a teacher, I’ve been in school for more than 40 years, and I’ve just finished another graduate degree. You understand, then, why I’m wary of becoming one of Grandma’s ‘smarty-pants’ academics.

Though God says much about wisdom, knowledge, and understanding, He seems to contradict Himself. Proverbs 4:5, for example, tells us to pursue wisdom, but I Cor. 3:20 says *“the thoughts of the wise are futile.”* These apparent contradictions, of course, stem from differences between godly wisdom and human, worldly wisdom. Godly and worldly wisdom differ not in amounts or kinds of education, but in what they acknowledge as reality.

Godly wisdom knows that God exists, and that we depend upon Him for our past (He created us), our present (He cares for us), and our future (hope for eternity). A worldly person is arrogantly self-reliant, and *“in all his thoughts there is no room for God”* (Ps. 10:4). *“Your wisdom and knowledge mislead you when you say to yourself, ‘I am, and there is none besides me’”* (Is. 47:10). Romans 1 says that godless thinking is futile, foolish (v. 21-22), leading people to abandon Truth for lies (v. 25).

True wisdom isn’t acquired in universities. The church we attend includes two different individuals--Scotty and Jerry--who illustrate this fact. Scotty is a teenager with Down’s Syndrome, and Jerry is a retired Air Force Major General with a Ph.D. in astronautics. But what they share is more important: the humble, godly wisdom which comes from knowing God through His Word.

Their wisdom delights Jesus! In Luke 10:21-22, Jesus rejoices in the grace of His Father, who reveals Himself to those who approach Him in childlike dependence (cf. Matt. 18:1-4), but not to the ‘wise and learned,’ who depend only upon themselves.

We can each know God and His wisdom not because we are smart enough to discover these things by ourselves. No, the most profound truths of the universe are those God reveals to us because He is kind: *“You have made known to me the path of life; You will fill me with joy in Your presence, with eternal pleasures at Your right hand”* (Ps.16:11).

There’s nothing wrong with intelligence, education, practical or theoretical knowledge, or wisdom--as long as it relies upon God. That’s why, while working on my recent degree, I taped this verse to my computer: *“David said, ‘All this is in writing from the hand of the Lord upon me, and He gave me understanding in all the details of the plan’”* (1 Chron. 28:19). On our own, we can do nothing (Jn. 15:5), but *“the Lord gives wisdom; from His mouth come knowledge and understanding”* (Prov. 2:6).

# Getting to Know You

## “Let the Little Children Come to Me”

Children believe. In most cases they see a world that has not been dulled by the pressure and responsibilities of life. When a child sees a new fallen snow, they see fun and adventure as opposed to snow shovels and ice. When a child sees a mud puddle, they see a big splash as opposed to soiled garments. Somewhere along the way in life we often lose our sense of wonder. We pass by the same street on our way to work and don't even look at where we are going. We walk our children to the same parks and take for granted the lush green blades of grass on which we place our blankets. A child will observe and absorb their surroundings while adults forget the wonder of the world that surrounds them. Children open themselves up to experience life and to accept the gifts offered to them; the gift of a world of wonder and, more importantly, the gift given by a Holy Creator. Perhaps this is why Jesus tells us that we must receive Him as a child. It is this childlike faith that drew Mark to God and his earliest encounters with the Father.

Mark and Gina both grew up in religious homes. The families went to church and in turn both Mark and Gina knew there was a God. “When I was in fourth grade I was going through some difficult times and I couldn't talk to anyone about it. The only one I could talk to was God. I remember sitting in the back of the church talking to God, and a priest came to me and asked what I was doing. I told him I was talking to God and asked if it was okay to talk to God in my own words,” Mark remembered. Mark had the faith of a child and that faith led him to the perfect place for someone who is confused and struggling. It led him to the throne of the one who hears and heals. Mark continued to talk to God throughout his adolescence, although it wasn't something that he shared with others.

After high school Mark went to the Milwaukee School of Engineering and while he was there he often spent time at the airport watching the aircraft. It was this fascination with aircraft and Mark's desire to build and use his hands that led him to the U.S. Air Force.

After Mark enlisted in the military he was stationed at Hill Air Force base in Utah. While at the same time Gina was in Salt Lake City, Utah for nurses' training.

Gina had been born in Utah, but shortly after her birth her family moved to a farm in Colorado. Gina's family really enjoyed their life in Colorado, but because of her father's health her family moved to Nebraska when Gina was

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three. Gina liked the Western part of the United States, so she decided on Salt Lake City after high school. "Omaha was too far East for Gina," Mark laughed.

Mark and Gina, as Catholics, were the minority in Salt Lake City as most of the people were Mormon. This common thread helped to bring the couple together, but it also took some good scheming by Mark to bring them together. The Air Force held a dance and invited the girls at the nursing school to attend. Gina went to the dance, but Mark did not. However, one of Gina's friends met an airman who was friends with Mark. This airman wanted to take Gina's friend on a date, but he didn't have a car. Mark on the other hand did have a car, so the airman asked Mark to drive if he found Mark a date. The airman did find Mark a date, but it wasn't Gina. Gina was set up with another airman, so the three girlfriends went out with the three airmen. "Because Gina wasn't my date I sat directly across from her, so I noticed her all evening," Mark said. "I didn't notice Mark because I wasn't wearing my glasses, so I couldn't even see across the table," Gina laughed.

From that evening on, Mark wanted to get to know Gina more. He asked her to another dance in which she declined having already invited the airman she was paired with on the date. Mark hearing the reason for her rejection, took matters into his own hands. He told the other airman that you could only attend the dance if you had a date, and since Gina's invitation wasn't an official date the other airman stayed home. Mark then went to the dance and asked Gina for a dance, and Gina after realizing that the other airman wasn't coming, agreed.

That dance led to another date to a Peter Paul and Mary concert. "Mark didn't realize that I borrowed the dress, the coat and I don't remember maybe even the shoes. He thought I looked great," Gina said. "I thought she was gorgeous," Mark smiled. "And it was a good thing we ended up at the front of the concert because I didn't wear my glasses again," Gina added.

Four months later in May, Mark was going to be stationed in Hawaii. Mark and Gina knew that they didn't want to spend the next two years apart, so in the course of two weeks the couple planned the wedding and were married. "My mom was amazing. She made three dresses and a wedding cake in two weeks!" Gina stated.

The couple was now on their way to Hawaii for the next two years. "I think it was a blessing for us. We were going off on our own and we only had each other to depend on. It helped us become very close as a couple," Gina commented. The couple also had a very limited budget. Mark earned \$204 a month and the apartment rent was \$115 a month. Gina's grocery budget was \$30 dollars a month. "The only thing really inexpensive in Hawaii was pineapple juice, so to this day Mark will not drink pineapple juice," Gina laughed.

In 1965, after being released from the Air Force, Mark decided to go to the Spartan School of Aeronautics and finished in 1966, during which time Gina worked at a hospital to help make ends meet.

The couple had a short stay in Kansas City where Mark worked for Braniff International before moving to Minneapolis in July of 1967 to work for the same company. A year after arriving in Minneapolis the couple welcomed their first miracle, Gretchen, in July of '68. Gretchen was truly a miracle to the couple who was told after five years of marriage and all the fertility tests that adoption would be their only option for children. God, however, had different plans and blessed them with two other children after Gretchen, Bob in '69 and Steve in '72.

Mark and Gina, while growing their family, were also going through a series of layoffs in the airline industry. From 1969-1973 Mark worked for a few different airlines in different cities. Mark spent two and a half years commuting to Chicago while the children were young. "I felt like a guest in my home. While I was home we tried to do fun things with the children, so Gina took care of all the work while I was gone," Mark stated.

The time Mark spent commuting came to an end in 1973 when Mark was again able to work from Minneapolis. The position was an overnight position, but at least he was home. "Gina was good to turn some of the household responsibilities back over to me when I came back," Mark said.

In 1973, Gina not only turned over some of the household responsibilities, but she also turned her life over to God. "Mark would work nights so I would read. I love to read. I read *The Late Great Planet Earth*, and I wondered if the scriptures in that book were true," said Gina. This curiosity led Gina to a Bible study at her church and ultimately to a saving faith in Jesus Christ.

Mark soon shared Gina's faith, but it was not easy for Gina to wait for him to join her in serving Christ. "I always asked him if he would mind if I went to a Bible study. Most of the time he didn't mind, but if he did, I would stay home and smile without a word and go on with my normal day." Mark noticed all these changes in Gina and wasn't sure

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what to think of what he saw. It wasn't until he agreed to go to a Life in the Spirit Conference that he heard the gospel and dedicated his life to Christ.

From that point on, the couple grew in faith and knowledge of the Lord and felt that the Lord was directing them to stay in the Catholic Church to serve Him there. The couple obeyed and saw much fruit until 1984. In 1984, the couple felt God lead them out of ministry in the Catholic Church when the openness to the Holy Spirit was replaced with tradition. "Leaving was very hard. One day I sat down and cried as I thought of the over 300 people that I knew, who had come to a saving faith in Christ through the ministry myself and others were doing in the Catholic Church. It hurt to be told we could no longer do that type of ministry in the church," Gina commented with tears in her eyes.


After leaving the Catholic Church the couple continued to serve and saw their children make commitments to Christ. They also added to their family in 1991 by bringing their fifteen year old niece, Cindy, into their home after her mother died in a car accident.

In 2005, the couple made their way to Waseca after spending nine years in Duluth where Mark had a challenging job as a Maintenance Program Specialist for the 319 and 20 airbuses. This position gave the couple the opportunity to travel to places like Germany and France. Mark is now retired after 34 years in the airline industry and the couple is enjoying their time together in Waseca. "We have been accused of being attached at the hip," Gina laughed. "I really enjoy Mark's company." "It helps that she likes to fish," Mark added with a grin.

The couple really enjoys their growing family as well. Gretchen and her husband Chris have three children ages 15, 13 and 9. Bob and his wife Rachel also have three children ages 9, 7 and 5. Steve and his wife Angela have two children ages 5 and 3, and niece Cindy is also married to her husband, Kris.

God is faithful. "We can look back over our lives and see how God has taken care of us even when we didn't realize it," Mark stated. Like God's hand on a fourth grade boy who spoke pure, uninhibited, quiet concerns and questions in his own words to a loving Father. The words prayed were not perfect, but they were from the heart. That is all God asks from us, He wants our hearts. It isn't works or fancy words that save, but grace through faith in Christ Jesus; faith like a child.


